Master in Dubai and Bangalore

Dubai, October 22-31, 2008

During Master's visit to Dubai in October, he talked informally with abhyasis on many occasions at the dining table, in the living room and the garden. It was a great delight

to be near him and to bask in his presence. Following are some extracts from informal conversations.

• An abhyasi handed Master a small envelope with a card inside. The card was stuck in the envelope. As he tried to get it out of the envelope, Master compared it to the human heart, saying, "They give it to you to open but you cannot open it."

• After being presented with a box of sweets by an abhyasi. He looked over at a sister and wanted to give her Prasad; she said she had already received. Master then told a story about telling the truth, about an old man who made his living from cutting firewood. One day while having his picnic lunch, the man's axe fell into the pond and he was desolate. An angel helped him out by diving into the pond and retrieving a series of axes, the first made of diamond, another of gold and finally one of silver; each time the man told him it was not his axe. When the angel dove in one last time and came out with his real axe, he was rewarded for telling the truth; the angel gave him all of the axes. Ten years later the man was picnicking by the same pond with his wife, and she fell in. Again he was desolate at the loss of his life-long companion. The angel appeared again to help, dove into the pond, and came up with a famous actress. The man claimed her as his wife, which angered the angel who knew the truth and challenged the man. The man explained that he didn't want a repeat of the previous situation, when the angel rewarded his truth-telling by giving him all of the axes retrieved from the pond! Master concluded the story by cautioning



us that one has to be careful even when telling the truth.

• Master said you can know a people by the god they worship, but you cannot know God by the people who worship Him. He said the idea of knowing God is always individual, it cannot be communal. As a group we can pray; as individuals, we can seek and do what is necessary.

• An abhyasi told Master she feels a strong pull to be more collective and to be around more abhyasis more of the time. Master referred to the game of "tug of war" and said that combined effort of more people yields greater achievement;

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if we are all thinking of the same thing, we can realize it better than any individual. He emphasized that the achievement is always individual, comparing it to feeding a million people individu-

ally, though they come as a group.

An abhyasi asked Master how to attract local
"Londoners" to Sahaj Marg.
Master said, "Don't treat

them as Londoners. Treat them as human beings. We create barriers by thinking."



• Master referred to a common tendency to look at work as belonging to different categories, for example, simple work, difficult work, useless work, valuable work and so on. He said that "work is work" and there is no second category, and anything that has to be done must be done.

• About food, Master said we should eat without expectation and comparison. But we compare everything and so we suffer.

• Master said we create impressions because we allow our minds to be absorbed in what is happening around us. In spirituality, the soul absorbs. He said that dreams containing instruction from the guru are absorbed by the soul, though we don't remember. The highest form of instruction is in sleep because there is no resistance, the consciousness is not awake.

• Master said that the difference between wanting (desire) and doing (will) is a fundamental fact of life. He said that initially our desire is always active and we have not exercised and trained the will, which we must do. He re-

minded us that every time we use the will it becomes stronger, and every time we do not use the will it becomes weaker. There is no static will.

• Master sang a line from the movie *The Sound of Music*, "Somewhere in my youth or childhood, I must have done something good." He said instead of the word "good" we should substitute the words "something which caused this."

Master encouraged us to realize that prejudices, like personal likes and dislikes, make us more miserable than anything else; and we should give them up. outer cleanliness, referring to Babuji's requirement that for a spiritual person the inside and the outside must both be clean. He said the physical ambience must be so clean that mosquitoes and flies stay away. Master referred to the size of the ashram, and anticipated it becoming too small. He talked about organic growth as natural, not haphazard, and said that in the West there is an idea that unless everything is planned at the beginning, it is poor planning. He said that adding facilities as we go along produces a beauty of its own which cannot be achieved with advance planning.

Master told a brother informally that the world takes care of itself. He said for each individual, if the heart is okay, the world is okay and will always be safe. He said this world is a "strictly personal" world and the word "global" does not exist in spirituality. He said for each one of us my heart reflects my world, my heart builds my world, and my heart supports the world. He specified that our individual wellbeing and safety does not depend on the American economy or who would be the next president. He said we build our

> future and our universe with our heart. He concluded by asking us to believe this and encouraging us to exercise our right to do it and enjoy the result.

> During his stay in and around Bangalore Master visited several places, including two housewarmings, an outing to a cinema, and a day and overnight stay at CREST, before returning to Manapakkam by road on 12 November. Abhyasis awaiting his arrival at Babuji Memorial Ashram were very happy to welcome Master back after more than a month away.

Bangalore, October 31 - November 12, 2008

Master flew from Dubai to Bangalore on 31 October. On 2 November he inaugurated the beautiful new Param Dham ashram in south Bangalore and welcomed all assembled to this "wonderful place." He referred to the Gita and Lord Krishna's definition of *Param Dham* as the place which you reach and from which you don't return, literally the Divine Abode. He expressed hope that the ashram would fulfill its purpose of taking us up in our spiritual evolution to the Highest. He specified that spiritual places should provide for elderly people, and therefore an elevator has been installed and the beautifully designed staircase is comfortable for older people; medical attendants will be on call and security provided. He insisted upon the need for inner and

Charlotte, North Carolina Regional Gathering by Manohar Adusumilli

The Charlotte (North Carolina) Center hosted a regional gathering on September 13th and 14th with attendance by 62 abhyasis and 20 kids from the Carolinas and nearby states. The theme of the gathering was "Master's Role in our Lives."

The gathering started on Saturday with a 10 a.m. satsangh followed by talks related to the theme. A number of questions were prepared to reflect upon our relationship with the Master. Several abhyasis shared their views after the introspection. It was fascinating to hear several abhyasis sharing their solutions to the questions with the rest of the group. A common message was that we should be aware of our surroundings just as Master is. Such awareness teaches us in many ways.



After lunch we had a fun game that got abhyasis mingling and getting to know each other. Next, abhyasis formed into groups to go through the selected readings and discuss them among themselves. The discussions focused on the need to be with Master and the avenues available for us. The points were made that being physically close to Master is wonderful but it is not possible for everyone. Therefore, it is vital for every abhyasi to have a personal internal relationship with the Master. This type of relationship enables us to be with him all of the time.

During the afternoon a child of an abhyasi, Elijah (5th Grade), performed a magic show. His performance delighted kids and adults alike. The show was followed by a small play and songs sung by the kids. We had evening satsangh at 5 p.m. After dinner there was a short video presentation.

On Sunday we had satsangh at 9 a.m. followed by a reading. Next we had a crossword puzzle with questions from the Sahaj Marg Yatra game. A few abhyasis shared their experiences related to the theme and then we had lunch. Everyone left with feelings of contentment and happiness. We appreciated everyone's active participation.

The Gainesville, Florida, center hosted a gathering during the weekend of September 27th and 28th, 2008. The venue for the gathering was the India Cultural and Education Center. About 50 *abhyasis* and 20 children from Florida, Georgia and Alabama brought their hearts to the gathering. Brother John and Sister Betsy Barlow, who were visiting Florida that week, also attended the gathering. The theme of the gathering was "Here and Now," a continuation of the theme from the national gathering in Cleveland, Ohio (April, 2008). Master has been talking about the importance of the "Here and Now" in his talks since the 1970s. He often says, "forget the past, don't worry about the future, live in the present because the present is a gift." A collection of excerpts from his talks since the 1970s in which he talks about the "Here and Now" was distributed to abhyasis prior to the gathering.

Brother John Barlow conducted the Saturday morning satsangh and gave a talk in which he emphasized the importance of the practice more so in the present day and age than at anytime in the history of man because in the present day and age the mind has so many avenues of diversion that regulating it is more challenging than ever. A disciplined sadhana is an absolute requirement to experience our true divine self. He emphasized that if the practice is followed as prescribed, the results are replicable.



There were several talks emphasizing that if we put off our goal to some time in the future and if we keep putting it off, we will never get to the goal. As well, the talks emphasized that there needs to be a sense of urgency to experience reality here and now because the godly presence is here and now waiting to be felt by us.

There were children's activities organized by sister Tiffany Ballard. There was a bouncy house for the children to enjoy. All of the out-oftown abhyasis that stayed Friday night and/or Saturday night were accommodated at local abhyasis' homes. Several introductory sittings were given during the weekend.


San Luis Obispo, California Camping at Lake Lopez by Venkat Jayaraman

Abhyasis from California and nearby states have been congregating for an annual campout at the end of the summer for the past 10 years. The venue, Lake Lopez, is near San Luis Obispo, California. Lake Lopez is surrounded by mountains and offers lots of activities—hiking, boating, sailing, swimming, a water park, and open grounds for any kind of sports. Brother Bill and sister Diana Waycott have been the loving and gracious hosts for several years. This year we had the opportunity to spend three nights and four days (Friday through Monday) at the camp grounds. Abhyasis came from Nevada, Arizona and even Canada. Satsangh was held in the mornings at 9 am and in the evening at 5 pm. The meditations were held in an open space and they were as close to nature as one can get. 

Important notice for visitors to Babuji Memorial Ashram, Manapakkam, India

With the permission of Rev. Master, we have employed professional security at the main gate of the Babuji Memorial Ashram, Manapakkam effective from 1st August 2008. Hence in the future, it is essential for abhyasis visiting the Manapakkam Ashram to carry their SRCM Abhyasi Card (Temporary or Permanent) and produce the same to the Security personnel at the main gate upon entry into the Ashram. It is to be noted that the Mission badge alone is not sufficient to enter the Ashram. If the SRCM Abhyasi card is not available, a signed letter of identification from your local centre-in-charge/prefect should be produced to the security personnel.

Region In Charge & Regional Coordinators Corner

Letter from John Barlow, R.C. Region I, East

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

How quickly things change. A few months ago we were talking about a number of expansion projects for the Mission in the U.S. & Canada, including plans for expanding the Molena Ashram and the Sunderland Meditation Center, as well as investigations into the possibility of purchasing a meditation center in New Jersey and land in California. Since then our Master has requested that we put all Mission projects on hold (unless doing so will add additional expense) as we await the outcome of the present economic instability.

Additionally, he requested that the Mission hold off on any expenditures except for what is essential and only that which could be covered by current income. At the end of the circular he reiterated that we may apply the same principles to each of our individual lives and that current income should be used if one wishes to attend local and regional gatherings and not savings or borrowed money, paying careful attention to the needs of the family.

Master has also spoken recently on character development and affirmed "that while it was HIS duty to give the abhyasis inner spiritual growth, character formation was, and will always be, the abhyasis' personal business." He went on to say that the "culture/society" that we happen to be born into does not absolve us of our own inner compass. "A body of universally applicable teaching MUST reflect principles and practices that will be all encompassing, transcending the cultural, religious and behavioural norms laid down for people not involved with personal spiritual development." So in effect we are held to a higher ideal.

A quote from Whispers speaks to this most succinctly. As Babuji communicates, "It is important not to harm others. On the basis of this principle, a spiritual process can be established favourably. As the human being is not perfect, he should not dwell on the weakness of others. He has enough to do with himself, but many of our brothers are busy observing the others, and neglecting their own faults... It is so much easier to apply this policy and to think that only the others must change." (*Whispers, Wednesday, May 14,* 2003)

I believe there is always a need to look for ideas and insight as to how best to approach our own individual character development, which might also be thought of as development of "conscience." When I am unsure of how to proceed, I sometimes ask myself, if I wrote to Master tonight and asked his opinion of this action, what would he say? As Babuji has said, we should not do something that "pricks" the heart of another, a universally applicable guideline.

Opportunities & Events

Term Residency Program at the Molena ashram

The SRCM North American ashram is offering a Term-Residency program for abhyasis who would like to live at the Molena Ashram for a defined period of time, be a part of the community, and get a feel for ashram life and organization. The Term-Residency program is for abhyasis who are able to dedicate 1 to 6 months to staying at the ashram and would like to devote that period of time to both spiritual evolution and active participation in the work of Sahaj Marg and other ashram activities. There is no fixed fee for the program, but term-residents may be asked to contribute nominally toward the cost of food and utilities.

The atmosphere at the 32-acre wooded hilltop ashram, located in Molena, Georgia (about 60 miles south of Atlanta), is always spiritually charged, and the calm and peace that prevails there is conducive for spiritual pursuit. Living at an ashram provides a unique experience of being in a special environment conducive to change and spiritual evolution. At the ashram, you will have a designated prefect and will be able to participate in satsanghs. From time to time, there will also be study and training programs on the Sahaj Marg philosophy and way of life.

Your stay will be a balance of three components: spiritual immersion, practical work, and brotherhood. You may participate in selfstudy and can use the Ashram library as part of your spiritual program. Together with caretakers at the ashram you will identify the tasks that are appropriate for you. Some of the work areas at the ashram are: the kitchen, gardening, building maintenance, and organizing seminars.
