



Growth is Natural by Ludovic Odier, Singapore

The Asian Seminar kicked off with the talk, "Mouth Speaks But The Heart Understands" by Sis. Srimathi Rathod. Soon after the talk began, Master arrived to listen. He remarked, "Master gives us everything we need but it is up to us to use it. Are our hearts attentive? Will we be making the most of the Seminar?"

The Singapore Centre abhyasis followed this up with their outreach programmes at the Centre, and for the public in Singapore. One of the key lessons for the day was to drop the distinction between abhyasis and non-abhyasis. We were reminded again we are all brothers and sisters, and a willing heart is needed on both sides for a connection to happen.

The next morning, Bro. Capt. Chakrapani captivated the audience with his talk, "What am I?" He shared his vicissitudes and his thoughts as a ship captain alone at the helm, as a CEO and as a husband. He talked about the man he ought to be, following His Master and His path. Like for many of us, it was a story of change and transformation. We were moved by his humanity, humility and heart.



That afternoon a touching and somewhat humorous account of how the Mission in China got a real spurt of growth following the visit of a group of French abhyasis was recounted. They called themselves "the French Fries" who went to meet the Chinese, whom they affectionately called, "the Fried Rice". Beyond countries, nationalities and cultures, we were truly inspired by a demonstration of love, courage and bold faith. A small group of abhyasis, through numerous open houses and encounters, made a such big difference to those interested in spirituality in China.

Day three, Bro. N. Prakash gave a heartfelt talk, "*Be Connected to Him*". He shared with passion the story of his connection with Master. We felt the trepidation of his journey as a trekker following a humble mountain guide from the valley to the summit. I could not help but think of my own path and connection with Him. That afternoon offered a chance to participate in a lively Q&A session with a panel of three preceptors, who answered questions about meditation, spiritual progress, satsangh, cleaning and the 'taming' the ego.

Another giant, Bro. P.R. Krishna gave the last talk on Thursday titled, "*Growth is Natural*", the Seminar's underlying theme. He recounted the moment of creation upto the time of Man, the time at which, he said, growth stops being natural as men tend to mess things up. Through his superpowers, mind and will, humanity seems about to crash now. Can we do something about it? He commented, "Isn't Sahaj Marg about bringing a much needed transformation? Is there hope?" There is still hope, he said, if each of us changes. As much as Master brings us hope and gives All, are we listening? Are we following our Hearts in this regenerative quest?

The audience was spellbound throughout the Seminar. Hearts were beaming, joyful in brotherhood, thankful for every day for a lesson learnt. The last day was graced by Master's presence and His closing speech. Much to my dismay, I missed it as I had already flown back to Singapore. he region's new abhyasis including those who had not met Master earlier, had a golden opportunity to meet Master at close quarters. Master started off the conversation in his trademark, heart-winning style of explaining the Sahaj Marg system succinctly. He said we spread Love with no barriers in our system. One abhyasi remarked and thanked Master for drawing her in at the right time. He responded the right time should be every time, and gave the analogy of the seed. He said the seed should be sown and watered at the right time and intervals, allowing the sun to shine at the right time, etc. Similarly, the right time does not stop once in our spiritual life. Everything should be continued at the right time, every time.



Another abhyasi requested for blessings to carry Master in the heart forever from that instant. Master said He is always present and that the seed is sown at the first sitting itself. On insistence, He said, "If you ardently wish, it will happen".

He said the human relationship whether between spouses or between parents and children doesn't depict real Love. True relationship is possible only between Guru and disciple. He remarked, there is frantic sex in today's world, and sex and love are inversely proportional. More and more of love would mean less and less of sex, and more and more of sex implies less and less of love. Master also emphasized, "the heart has to be cleaned day after day to be fit to receive His grace to grow."

He also finally said, "When you go out from here, develop the courage to Love everyone with no restrictions". Abhyasis came out feeling elated with beaming faces - some with welled up tears of joy and gratitude, touched in a unique, miraculous way somewhere in the heart. It rests upon us to apply this in our life!



Children

hen the word was out that children from Singapore may get to see Master, they stopped all their activities to wait outside His cottage.

In every child, one could see the children's eagerness to be with Master "Thatha". The boys who would not usually sit still for a second waited quietly until Master came out and sat in His chair. When He started to give out candies, saying, "one by one", without being told by adults, the children waited their turn to go to Master.

He joked with the children, telling one child not to be shy, while another not to ask for more candy. When the child persisted in asking for more, He brought the child close to Him, touched His beard said, "If you eat too many sweets, you will become an old man like me. The child promptly replied, "I want to be an old man like you"!

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Preceptors

hile the Asian Seminar was in full swing, Master very graciously scheduled some time for preceptors.

He started off on a jovial note saying, "We have exchanged pleasantries, what do we do now?" leaving everyone tonguetied unexpectedly. After a brief lull, preceptors mainly from China, fielded their questions in all earnest.

Below is an extract of the Master's responses:

"Sahaj Marg does not select. We accept anyone who comes. We do not reject because we believe those who come, come for some good. Many come for better life, relationships, etc. When our preceptors introduce Sahaj Marg, they must talk to them about two things:



- Guaranteed spiritual progress if we do what we have to do. Meditate in the morning and in the evening. Do the cleaning. Do the practice.
- Meditation does not do anything for material progress but if it does then it is according to one's samskaras. As we progress by meditation and cleaning properly, we change.

I believe before a child is born, the soul chooses who the parents should be for its evolution. The soul knows what is good. After we are born, somehow the program changes. Why? Because of our desires. Desires change the program and we suffer. With the original program, we would be liberated. When there is no desire there is no temptation, no corruption of the program and there is liberation.

It is wrong to blame circumstances. We are totally responsible for what we have. You do what you have to do. The beauty of Sahaj Marg is I don't give up. What needs to go, will fall off. It is a system to make one a perfect human being.

Once a preceptor asked Babuji about non-abhyasis. He replied that we create barriers when we say non-abhyasis. On Sunday satsanghs, only those who attend will appear before Babuji like on a TV screen. Our aim is to make all meditate for their own good. So when we are doing for others everything is right. If they are late, leave the doors open. In the West, they are guided by time. In the East, they are guided by the heart."

hirty-one abhyasis including all six prefects from Sri Lanka participated in the Asian Seminar. Of the 31, 18 were new abhyasis who saw our Master in person for the first time. efore going to India for the Asian Seminar, I was very worried about my visa application, as this would be the third time within the past one year that I have applied for an Indian visa.

Jibun ga omote mo inai koto o jibun ga okoshite to omouwanakatta.

I realised, I didn`t really know, everything I have experienced in my life, is what I`ve created.

800 years ago, green tea was brought from China to Japan by the monks who went to China to learn more about meditation. The monks started to use the tea, for the spiritual purposes of meditation, to represent simplicity. The tea was refined and called 'matcha', which was to be used in 'The Japanese Tea Ceremony'. The tea, is used to rid the heart of prejudices, and reflect the inner mind through the gestures of the ceremony's meditative movements.

It has been 40 years since I have performed a tea ceremony. When Bro. Sriram asked me to perform it during the cultural event at the Asian Seminar, I agreed. I realised it was the unfolding of one of my samskaras.

Even though I was in India, I didn't feel I was in



a foreign land. I naturally slipped into the atmosphere and the environment of Manapakkam Ashram. When I was there, I realised I had many confronting issues that I was battling with, that I didn't want to acknowledge, and consequently they didn't seem to go away. It was a tough time for me.

I didn't want to be the main presenter at the tea ceremony. I just wanted to be the helper. I was used to having someone else do these things. I kept asking Sis. Clarissa, what to do, and she reacted differently than she usually would. She told me to speak directly to the people concerned with the questions I had. I found out that I didn't want to be held responsible if things didn't work out, so I wanted Sis. Clarissa to lead!

Because of these complications I created, I found myself in a familiar situation. But this time, I saw that I was running away from my responsibilities and how insensitive I was to people, all the while thinking previously I was the opposite.

Japan is a small island surrounded by water and is afraid of other countries but has copied and received many of their ideologies and accustomed itself to a Japanese-Foreign way of living. We, as Japanese, have improved on materialistic products with our 'eye for detail'; to work long hours without question, under high expectations and with perseverance.

I feel because of it, we have lost our inner human spirit. During the Seminar, I experienced many emotions I wouldn't have felt, thought or even known were inside me, had I not been asked to perform this ceremony. Evidently, for the first time, I saw and felt, that I too, came from this Japanese orientation of heart and mind that I couldn't and didn't want to previously admit to. I underwent a lot of self-awareness. Without a doubt, I now know which road to take. I'm grateful to Master for showing me the way and in having to write this article.
