Master's Talk

Excerpt from "Always Be Loving" Basant Panchami, 15 February 2013 Manapakkam, Chennai

Worse than this physical, shall I say, intoxication with the pleasures of life is the ego, because the ego rules us. It is the ego which makes a man *assert* and be assertive. The western world teaches students how to be assertive, how to climb the ladder even at the cost of other human beings, so that they can reach the top and rule and, of course, make money. The



whole modern education tends to focus on the ego – not on perfection, which is good, but on domination. "You are the dominant person in this class." And we are rewarded for our dominant qualities, which are so bad for others, which only puff up our ego more and more, until we become what we call in our mythological world language – *raakshasas, asuras* [demons] – men with enormous power of the ego but no wisdom, who eventually destroy themselves, but only after they have destroyed others.

Never speak an unkind word. *Never!* Always be loving. Because it is not you who love, it is His love which flows through your heart. And if you don't allow it to flow through your heart, you are condemning yourself to a loveless life, a life without love. It is like a river which has no water. What is the use? A dry riverbed is of no use. If you can see the riverbed, then where is the water?

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So when there is the ego, there is no love, only socalled total concentration on yourself, self-seeking, self-dominant, powerful, hateful, never able to show your heart to others. Therefore, people say he is a heartless fellow, or she is a heartless person. And a heartless person never goes anywhere. A dry river doesn't go anywhere; it is the water in the river which goes somewhere to the ocean.

So if our heart is there and love does not flow through it from Divinity to everybody on earth, every form of life on earth, it is like a dry riverbed – not going anywhere. It's a riverbed not going anywhere. So beware of using your egos; beware of flaunting your education or your dominance; beware of being unkind to others, ungenerous to others. Give as much as you can, not merely of material things, but of your heart.

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
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The heart only gives; it never takes. In the river, the water flows from up to down, never backwards. Similarly, love flows from Him through us, never from . . . He or she who expects love from others is like a river wanting the waters to flow backwards – which is not possible, which is against nature, and which is against Divinity. The law says: "Allow love from Him to flow through you to *all* human beings, animals, plants, trees, insects." That is why when we think of the law which says, especially the Christian commandments, 'thou shalt not kill', it does not mean thou shalt not kill human beings; otherwise it should have said so. 'Thou shalt not kill' means what? Everything! Otherwise we are saying 'thou shalt not kill means only human beings, because we are a protected race. Who protects us when we kill everything in nature? Killing doesn't mean only with a sword or with a gun; killing means with a dominant ego killing the spirit of another human being. Destroying his peace of mind, making him less than human, treating him as less than human, you have killed that person.

U.N. International Human Rights Day

Abhyasis in Cleveland, OH, invited the community to participate in observing International Human Rights Day with the theme, *How Hearts Move the World*. The invitation was to "join us for an inspirational look at how we change the world by our thoughts through prayer..."

With Master's guidance, we established a venue in the heart of the city where there are strong associations with peace projects; we connected with able speakers from other centers, Bob Perry and Tracie Pape, finding our third speaker when we met with Reverend Doug Wadkins, who had been wondering how his meditation would connect with prayer. Master even connected us with musicians while waiting for a bus one cold fall evening!

The weekend felt like a grand meditation that culminated with events on Sunday afternoon and Monday evening. Music, both recorded and performed live, began the events and became an integral part of the programs, setting the tone for the talks that were to follow. The attendees, abhyasis and members of the community, all joined in what was to be a prayer for humanity, highlighted by talks and the 9 O'clock prayer. The talks were inspiring and heartfelt, drawing on the expertise, passions and real life events of the speakers. Brother Bob Perry spoke passionately, saying, "Great advances on behalf of justice and freedom do not begin with a court ruling or legislative enactment. All great movements for social justice begin with the opening of hearts. These are ultimately victories of the human spirit, an aligning of the heart with tolerance, justice, peace, truth and - ultimately - with love." Sister Tracie Pape moved the audience deeply when she shared a lovely story of her work with children in the Peace Corp. Reverend Wadkins told a story of Maha Ghosananda, a Buddhist monk who stood before 20,000 Cambodians in an internment camp to speak to people who had survived atrocities, suffering and a great deal of loss. The words he chose came from the heart of their spiritual tradition as Buddhists. First his voice alone, then a few voices and then thousands joined in speaking these ancient healing words.

Hatred never ceased by hatred but by Love alone is healed. This is an ancient and eternal law.

On Monday evening, as I sat and listened to one of the speakers, the words that came to me were, "[O] to be that spark, that ember, to be...to be that which lights the world."



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Feature Bookstores



Molena Bookstore: A Brief History Shyamala Muralidharan

The Molena ashram bookstore was the first Mission bookstore in North America. It was originally a small room next to the meditation hall run by brother Rogerio and sister Kirsten Santos. In 1994 the bookstore moved to its current location. Until 1999, almost all of the Mission English language books were prepared by the North American Publishing Committee (NAPC), printed in the US for distribution around the world, and reprinted in India for Indian distribution. The Molena Ashram bookstore was the hub for the international distribution and for mail-order sales within North America. As the Mission grew, satellite bookstores were opened in Beavercreek, OH, Sunderland, MA, Austin, TX, San Jose, CA, Detroit, MI, and the latest at Monroe, NJ.

The bookstore has grown from using paper and pencil to keep track of sales, to the use of cash registers and credit card machines. These advances have increased sales and enabled the bookstore to take pre-orders for special publications. The bookstore has always had many willing and able volunteers, and it is currently in the very able hands of brother Madhu Sahaj, and sister Katherine Strozier.

The bookstore is operated by volunteers. Brother Madhu Sahaj and sister Lavanya Madhu have taken on the duties of our Molena Ashram bookstore from sister Shyamala Muralidharan and brother Muralidharan who worked diligently to streamline bookstore functions and to set up a universal process for all bookstores in the US.

Sisters Amanda Faulkner and Katherine Strozier assist Madhu in fulfilling online orders, receiving shipments from India, and selling books during bhandaras held at the ashram. There is a synergy amongst the volunteers who are happy to provide assistance to all.



Online orders are prepared for shipping each weekend and are picked up by the post office each Monday. If an item is out of stock, we usually include a note in the package to the sister or brother and/or call him or her to offer other suggestions.

Our busiest time is when we receive shipments from India. All brothers and sisters from Molena participate in unpacking, sorting, counting and repacking to send corpus books/DVDs/MP3s to other US SRCM bookstores. It is a nice feeling when Master's work is done with many hands joined together.

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Sister Bani Surapu functions as volunteer treasurer for all US SRCM bookstore operations. All bookstores send monthly sales reports and semiannual inventory reports to sisters Shyamala and Bani.

Sister Vera Lef maintains the US subscription database, doing an excellent job of assigning subscribers to the correct center, often creating new centers to accommodate new areas. She regularly updates the database, sending changes of address and new subscriber data to India. All bookstore volunteers use the updated database for corpus distribution.



New items are introduced after satsangh on Sundays when we play a portion of a DVD or read from a book. The new items are entered online as well as displayed in all of the US bookstores. At the Molena Ashram, and at some of the other SRCM centers as well, we have started a reading club, not only for new arrivals but including old favorites as well.

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Canadian Bookstores

After the Canadian Mission was formally established as a non-profit charity organization in 1973, Mission publications were available from a central bookstore located in Vancouver, British Columbia. About 10 years ago distribution was de-centralized, although Toronto became the primary bookstore, with satellite bookstores operating on a consignment basis in Vancouver, Nelson and Montreal.

Up until about 6 years ago, most inventory came from the Molena bookstore. I remember many a good time just after a seminar, packing books for the long drive back to Toronto. Today, with streamlined distribution, we receive our inventory directly from India – some of it brought with returning abhyasis.

Each centre has one or two designated persons in charge of all sales and accounting. During larger gatherings, items from the bookstores are brought to the venue and displayed for sale. We often see great sales figures from these gatherings. It's not unusual for abhyasis from the US to eagerly take home items that they could not find in the US bookstores. Although we do not have a large inventory in general, we do have a large variety of items that are hard to find anywhere else. Often we get orders from the US, which we are allowed to fill since we are a non-profit organization.

We have 55 corpus literature subscribers, 12 A/V corpus members, 55 *Constant Remembrance* subscribers and 4 *Sahaj Shishu* (Hindi) subscribers. In addition to English language books, we have books in Russian, Hindi, Tamil, Farsi and French.



What we're reading these days: short reviews by abhyasis

Autobiography of Ram Chandra, Volume II: "I came across it last fall. It contains the first intercommunication in Sahaj Marg between Lalaji and Babuji. It's a short passage, 40 to 50 pages. Very profound; very rich."

"I'm excited to see *Pursuit of the Inner Way* – a reissue of *The Principles of Sahaj Marg*, Volume 2. It's got all the basics: *Yoga through Love*; *Work and Play; Craving Reality*; and *Adoration*. The one I like is *The Friend Within*. The titles are relevant to life."

Complete Works of Ram Chandra, Volume II (Lalaji Maharaj): "By reading this book, I got to know Lalaji on a personal level; his love for his wife, in a very human and spiritual way, and his love for his children. He got angry! I saw who he was as a human being, not just as the Master."

Whispers from the Brighter World (over the Internet): "The most exciting thing I get lately is that transmission changes our vibration!"

Realidad al Alba (Reality at Dawn, in Spanish): "It reminds me that Sahaj Marg has spread worldwide; that people all over the world are reading this book in one language or another."





Discovering a Treasure Trove


Autobiography of Ram Chandra, Volumes I and II Jean-Pierre Le Grand

A while ago, my curiosity was piqued by a comment that Babuji makes, in one of the *Whispers from the Brighter World*, where he refers to the third volume of his writings, that contains his autobiography (*Complete Works of Ram Chandra*, Volume III), as the medium's favorite book. I was happy to find out that a sizeable portion of this book is actually Babuji's diary, which I found to be an incredible source of inspiration, even though I must confess I understood only a fraction of it – clearly, something goes on here, beyond words and ideas.

Moving into volume II of *Autobiography of Ram Chandra*, I discovered the record of Babuji's intercommunications with Lalaji – the very first *Whispers*, in fact – from 1944 to 1955. A number of illustrious souls, such as Swami Vivekananda, Mahatma Buddha and others, also speak. These pages are like nothing else I have ever read, inside or outside of the Mission's literature. As they also contain a record of the early days of the Mission, and of how Babuji came to be its founder, I see these writings as a treasure trove of insights and revelations, and I believe it to be invaluable material for the seeker.

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Reading Babuji from the Heart

"The most important factor in realization is selfconfidence in our own capacity and power to achieve success." (Complete Works of Ram Chandra, Vol. 1, 1989, p. 40.) These words of Babuji's have been running through my head over the past few months. They're usually joined by the following: "... if you take up the positive view and accept one thing only as real, sticking to it wholeheartedly, other things will naturally fall in the background..." (p. 100) In late November, I began rereading Babuji's work, Reality at Dawn, selecting quotations that touched my heart, while preparing for a book group that I would facilitate at the Sunderland Ashram in early December. These are two of those quotes and they continue to help me handle challenging situations, empowered and in remembrance. And, each time that I put Babuji's words to the test and watch what happens, my faith grows, and another thought resonates within me.

Another gift of Babuji's from *Reality at Dawn*: "True faith is really an unspeakable virtue which is beyond

the scope of religion, it is the dauntless courage which leads us on to success, it is that ubiquitous force which makes our path smooth, it is in fact the only thing that solves our problem of life." (p. 79) No wonder Master keeps encouraging us to read and reread Babuji's works! *Efficacy of Raja Yoga in the Light of Sahaj Mar*g is next.

Prayer Workshop *Meera Raghavan, Tampa, FL, and Srinivas Yaarragunta, Jacksonville, FL*

A Prayer Workshop was held on Saturday, January 19th, in Tampa, and in Jacksonville on January 27th. The morning session began with satsangh, after



which there was time for preparatory inquiry and self-reflection. Master, in an audio from the 1985 Vorauf Seminar, clearly explained the meaning of the Mission prayer. During an exercise in pairs, several excerpts on the purpose and meaning of prayer supported the understanding of our attitude while praying. The morning session concluded with another time of self-reflection.

The afternoon session began with a slide presentation, leading us through Master's teachings on prayer, including the 9 p.m. Universal Prayer. We then saw brother Kamlesh's video on our attitude toward prayer. In small groups we had the opportunity to share interpretations and views after reading excerpts of the Masters' teachings on prayer, from which we learned a great deal. This program gave us an opportunity to understand, correct and realign ourselves with the Mission prayer, as it is prescribed. It's an eye-opener for us to know how the prayer helps us progress, as Master says that by uttering this prayer mentally just once, a connection with him is created; that is its only purpose. The flow of transmission commences thereafter.

The workshop concluded with self-reflection and another video, followed by satsangh. After the workshop, we had a better understanding of the meaning, importance and potential of prayer, as well as the attitude we should bring to praying[•]
